

# **Hope So Bright Foundation**

The Hope So Bright Foundation (a private 501(c)(3) nonprofit) was founded in 2014 to help create awareness of the challenging circumstances faced by so many of our disadvantaged, under-served, at-risk, and special needs youth. Our primary focus is in the state of California, and orphanages abroad. Our mission is to support programs that have a lasting effect on these children by offering resources to support their basic needs and education - and inspiration to help them thrive. We do this by connecting with other like-minded 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations and offering financial support to fund programs and services that will accomplish these goals.

Projects and programs considered for funding include services for autism, ADHD, special needs, low income, and foster care children.

## **Background**

Despite the tremendous prosperity in this country, countless children must struggle with the effects of poverty on a daily basis. Others deal with disabilities and other issues that make it difficult for them to thrive. In the United States, 20% of children ages 0-17 live in poverty and 21% have been classified as "food insecure" by the USDA<sup>1</sup>. The CDC estimates that more than 5 million children ages 3-17 in the United States have ADHD, and children living in poverty and those in poor health have significantly higher rates of ADHD.<sup>2</sup> The rate of child maltreatment is 10 per 1,000 children and younger children are often more frequent victims of abuse than older children (1 per 1,000)<sup>3</sup>. Meanwhile, over 400,000 children are currently in the foster care system and the median age of these children is 6.4 years. California has the largest foster care population of any other state as the number of foster youth has tripled in the last 20 years<sup>4</sup>; 27% of these children will remain in foster care for as long as 2 to 5 years<sup>5</sup>.

About 1 in 6 children in the United States has a developmental disability, ranging from mild disabilities such as speech and language impairments to serious developmental disabilities, such as intellectual disabilities, cerebral palsy, and autism<sup>6</sup>. The CDC's Autism and Developmental Disabilities Monitoring (ADDM) Network estimates that 1 in 68 children has

autism spectrum disorder (ASD). Additionally, 15% of California children have special health care needs and it is estimated that 3.3% of our children have a major disability. Over 39% of California children with special health care needs do not receive needed mental health care and 70% of these children do not receive special education services.

# **Hope So Bright Grants**

**Eligibility:** Hope So Bright will only consider grant applications from 501(c)(3) nonprofit, tax exempt organizations with an Internal Revenue Service Determination Letter in hand.

**Eligible Activities:** Projects providing a lasting impact upon the lives of special needs and atrisk children.

**Geographical Focus:** Hope So Bright grants are limited to organizations providing services for at-risk and special needs children in California.

Funds Available: Hope So Bright will award grants ranging from \$5,000 to \$10,000.

### We will not fund:

- Grants to retire operating deficits or debt
- Grants for acute care, inpatient care or long-term care institutions
- Grants for emergency assistance organizations for routine service provision
- Grants to underwrite conferences, luncheons, galas or fundraisers
- Direct or indirect support for candidates, political parties, 501(c)(4) organizations or Political Action Committees
